# VIR's Six Races Tomorrow To Start

## Heaviest Program Ever Offered Features President's Cup Event

Never has there been a day of racing scheduled at Virginia International Raceway like that tomorrow.

Sunday's first race is scheduled at 9:30 a.m. There will be one every hour until 2:30 p.m. when the three-hour President's Cup Race will get underway. Thus, not only will there be more entries than ever before—150—but there will be much more racing. The first four races tomorrow will be 15 laps around the 3.2-mile paved road course. The fifth, for the large production models, will cover 17 laps. Then will come the big one for the speedily modified models.

Race Chairman Dave Roethel of the Washington Region, S.C.C.A., today announced the final program, ending several days of confusion caused by the large field of entries. Here is Sunday's official schedule:

- 9:30 a.m.—H-production, H-modified and compact sedans (15 laps).
- 10:30 a.m.—F and G-production (45 laps).
- 11:30 a.m.—D and E-production (15 laps).
- 12:30 p.m.—Formula Jr. and Formula III (15 laps).
- 1:30 p.m.—A, B and C-production (17 laps).
- 2:30 p.m.—President's Cup race for modified cars in Class C, D, E, F and G. (Three hours).
- 5:45 p.m.—Award of trophies at pagoda.

The formal presentation of the President's Cup will be made Monday afternoon at the Pentagon by Gen. Curtis LeMay, chief of staff for the Air Force, on behalf of President Kennedy.

Wall Hansgen of Greens Farms, Conn., "The Master of VIR," is the defending President's Cup Champion and will be seeking to become the only four-time winner of sports car racing's most prized trophy. He again will be driving No. 60, a D-modified Cooper-Maserati.

The Coopers will hear watching. In addition to Hansgen, Dr. Dick Thompson of Washington, D.C., will be in a Cooper-Buick in Class C, No. 61, and Roger Penske of Gladway, Pa., will be driving No. 6, a Cooper-Telar special, D-modified.

Chairman Roethel said today approximately 30 cars are expected to start in the President's Cup race. About 30 are lined up for the Formula Jr. and Formula III race. There are more Class

A cars than ever before. The field is large enough to offer keen competition at all levels.

As of this morning, 166 entries were listed with some expected to drop out and others show up. Exactly one-half had passed safety inspections at the airport by 9:30 a.m. and others were streaming in.

One of the missing is Briggs Cunningham, who is at Nassau for his "first love"—boat racing. Otherwise, all local favorites appeared to be back again for the national points event. Drivers lost no time in going to the track 11 miles east of the city and starting their practice runs.

Six qualifying races were scheduled this afternoon, starting at 3 p.m., to determine starting positions in the same order as the races will be run tomorrow. Each of these sprints was to cover three laps—9.6 miles.

Paul Rembold of the Civil Air Patrol sponsors, said today that it appeared all kinks had been ironed out for "VIR's Greatest Day."

He suggested that spectators show up early tomorrow. The track will be open into the infield before each race as time permits. However, the schedule is tight.

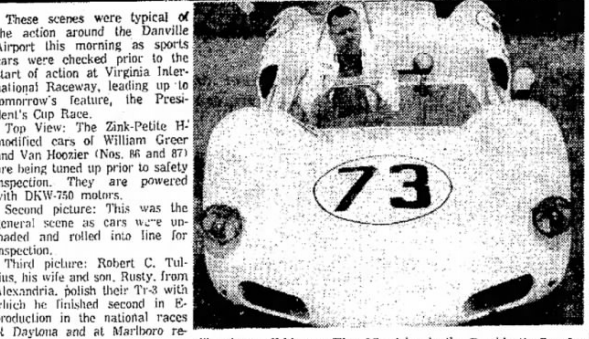
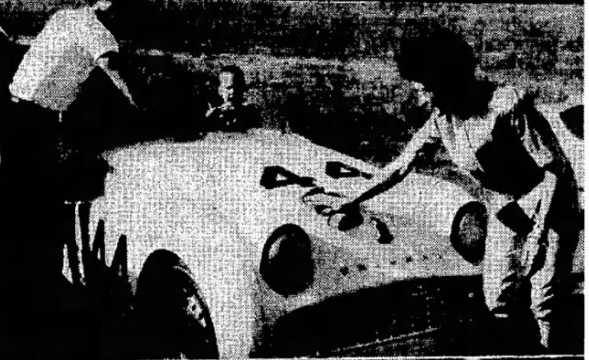
