## Bob Holbert Wins Sports Car Race

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla., Feb. 5.—(P)—Bob Holbert, a foreign car distributor from Warrington, Pa., drove his Porsche 61 at an average 96.80 m. p. h. for 35 laps over a 3.1 mile course today to win the featured Sports Car Club of America race.

Augie Pabst of Milwaukee, the pre-race favorite for the contest at the Daytona International Speedway, blew the engine of his Scarab in a morning workout and could not start.

His team-mate, Harry Heuer of Chicago, led for 17 laps in his Scarab but had to drop out with transmission and rear end failure.

Art Huttinger of Windermere, Fla., was second in a Lister Corvette. Chuck Cassel of Fort Lauderdale placed third in a Porsche 61 and Bob Johnson of Columbus, Ohio, was fourth in the 14 car field with a Corvette.

Charles Kurtz of Clearfield, Pa., came in first at an average 87.40 m. p. h. in a Lola in the 25-lap race over the 3.1 mile course.

Next in order were Bill Story of Clearwater in a Lotus and Donald Wolf of Cleveland in an Elva MKV.

The 30-lap race over the 1.63 mile course was won by David Lang of Fort Wayne, Ind., in a Bandini Saab at 63.35 m. p. h. Next were Howard Bernard of Broomal, Pa., in a DP and Tom Van Hoozier of Knoxville, Tenn., in a Zink Petite.
